





Four Years of Impact

The Norton Regional Health Foundation received two Pathways grants to improve community health and wellness using data-driven, community engagement. Grant funds were used to conduct a Community Health Improvement Plan and a local food assessment. These reports identified fresh produce access, childcare and pedestrian infrastructure as top community priorities.

USD 211 was awarded grant funding to extend sidewalks at Eisenhower Elementary School and close gaps in pedestrian infrastructure between the school and the Armory Drive trail and the adjacent neighborhood. The funding will also support future evaluation and planning of Safe Routes to School infrastructure throughout the community, providing children and families opportunities for physical activity while en route to school.

Feed My People and Norton Community Garden Coalition received funding to develop and expand community access to fresh produce in Norton County. Both gardens updated policies to improve access and ensure future community use of the gardens.

The Norton Correctional Facility (NCF) Dual Mural project engaged community members and NCF residents to foster community through the arts. Both groups created imagery and elements to design murals that explore their relationship and connection and will have an opportunity to review and approve the final design and paint the murals.
